

The COVID-19 pandemic has swept the world. Many countries have reported cases and deaths from Vatican City (The Holy See) to Argentina. The coronavirus has a mortality and transmission rate higher than that of the seasonal flu. With the first case of COVID-19 reported in Wuhan in China, this virus has spread rapidly, infecting politicians, celebrities, and everyday people. 


Generation Z: What is Gen Z? The Oxford Dictionary defines Generation Z as "the generation reaching adulthood in the second decade of the 21st century, perceived as being familiar with the Internet from a very young age". Generation Z comprises kids born from 1997 to 2012. That means that the oldest Gen Z'er is 23 and the youngest is 8. Pew Research Center was the group to notice the shift in culture between Millenials (the generation born between 1981 and 1996) and the new generation, our generation. A Morning Consult poll taken in June 2019 found three key defining traits about Generation Z: Motivated, Generation Z is motivated to make money and have a career; socially conscious, Generation Z is up to date with news and understands social issues very well and is more liberal because of this: and individualistic. Generation Z is like older generations in that they see their personality by their actions rather than who they are. The Morning Consult poll asked Gen Z adults what the three most important personal values were. Gen Z adults said that honesty, reliability, and commitment are the most important.

Generation Z, while not acting as a major voting force, is still a driving political, social, economical, and cultural power. Business Insider found that 59% of the members of Gen Z rated social media as a chief news source for them. Because of this, it seems that Gen Z is much more united on various social stances than other generations preceding them. After the Parkland shooting in 2018, survivor Emma Gonzales, then 18, got more than 1.6 million followers on Twitter and spread the message about gun control. The Pew Research Center found that 54% of Generation Z believed climate change was caused by human action. Gen Z Republicans are much more different than their


The Opinions of Trump's Performance Across Generations
Data Complied by Pew Research Center in Fall of 2018




The Opinions on Climate Change Across Generations

The Opinions of How Older Generations Left the World Across Generations




predecessors. Among Republicans in Generation Z, only 18% believed climate change was caused by natural patterns. People who identified as Republican among Millenials, Gen X'ers, and Boomers thought climate change was caused by natural patterns in 30, 36, and 42%, respectively.

The debate and polling site Tylt found that 70-80% of Generation Z supports legalized marijuana. Gen Z is the most diverse generation by far with 52% of Gen Z identifying as non-Hispanic whites, according to Pew. 62% of Gen Z believes diversity is good for society. With Millenials, about the same; Gen X is lower at 52%; Boomers at 48%, and Silents at 42%. Gen Z is also in favor of adding more options than man or woman with 59% supporting a third option. Millenials are split at 50%. The charts above show Generation Z compared with other generations. In the trust chart, it shows the percentage of people who trust those organizations or people. In the opinion of the President's job chart it shows the percent who approve of President Trump.

Overall, Generation Z is a new and powerful generation unlike any generation we've seen before. Powerful experiences have shaped our generation's way of thinking. Social media has become a way for our generation to experience a tight knit opinion that we share. Experiences like schools shootings and climate disasters have shaped the way we think as a whole. What If The General Presidential Election Needed to Be Postponed?

A Constitutional and Legal Look at the Elections and the Power of the President

Coronavirus fears have caused speculation regarding whether or not President Trump could postpone the general election while states have moved back the party nominations. Connecticut, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, and Ohio have all postponed their primaries. So, let's cut to the chase, regardless of political affiliation, could President Trump postpone the general election for president? Short answer: no. Long answer: Possibly. The 20th Amendment to the Constitution dictates that if a president isn't chosen by noon on January 20th, the time that presidential terms end, the Vice President elect will be the acting president until someone qualifies. Congress must, by law, provide a case if neither the president or the vice president qualify. Let's break this down, shall we?

Currently, our president is Donald Trump, a Republican up for re-election. The vice president is Mike Pence who is most likely to be on the ticket with Trump. There are currently two other candidates from a major party, the Democratic Party. Those are former Vice President Joe Biden (Vermont Senator Bernie Sanders dropped out in mid-April). For Donald Trump to postpone the general election between the nominees of the two major parties, the Republicans and the Democrats, as well as the other less prominent parties (Green, Libertarian, Constitution) he must go through nearly impossibly difficult political maneuvers. To pass a law, Congress must pass an identical bill in each house. We are currently under the 116th Congress which is split politically in each house. The House of Representatives is ruled by the Democratic Party with about 53% of the seats held by Democrats. The Senate is controlled by the Republican Party by 53% as well. For President Trump to move Election Day he must figure out a way to convince his own party as well as his opposing party to change the election date. This must pass in both houses. In the House, Democrats control the floor and they would, unless a severe emergency happened, most likely refuse to change the date of the election. The Senate may vote for a change. The law they would amend would be Title 3 of U.S. Code § 1. As I've said before, this would be incredibly unlikely. The election could not constitutionally be moved past January 20th of 2021.

So, could President Trump change the date of the election? Most likely not. Political scholars, both conservative and liberal, agree that he could not change Election Day without the support of Congress. With two different parties controlling two different houses of Congress, the possibility of a change in the presidential election is extremely unlikely.
